	OVERVIEW			
	<p>The District Calendar Committee unanimously recommends, for Board adoption, the revised calendar for the academic year 2007–2008. The revision is to the summer 2008 session. It was necessary to shorten the summer session to accommodate subsequent academic years. The summer session will now consist of a nine-week and a seven-week summer session. The Committee also recommends, for Board adoption, the “traditional” calendar for the academic years of 2008–2009 and 2009–2010. This is the first time the college is developing a two-year calendar. This enhances everyone’s ability for advance planning. The Committee is chaired by the Vice President for Academic Affairs and is composed of representatives of all major constituent groups at the college, including the Academic Senate, SCEA, CSEA, Classified Senate, Confidential Employees Group, Associated Student Organization, Counseling, and the Instructional Administrators.</p>

OVERVIEW

Faculty submit proposals for new and/or revised curriculum to the Curriculum Committee. The Curriculum Committee reviews and scrutinizes curriculum for academic rigor, transferability, and/or occupational competencies, student benefit, and institutional fit, as stated in Title 5 and the State Chancellor's Curriculum Handbook. Once these and other considerations are met, the Curriculum Summary Report is forwarded to the Superintendent/President and Governing Board for review and approval before being sent to the State Chancellor's Office.

The Southwestern College Curriculum Committee has reviewed and approved 13 new courses, 28 course modifications, 1 course inactivation, 1 new program, and 2 program inactivations.
